PRESIDENT

We hope everyone is staying safe and healthy. Writing this in the seventh month of the Covid-19 pandemic, it does not look like LW will be open and celebrating the holidays together. Miracles do happen and I hope we can be together again soon. Thank goodness we have this Newsletter to keep us informed about what is happening at Lauderdale West.

Governor DeSantis has slowly opened South Florida but many of the Broward County restrictions remain. It is incredible that we still have dedicated volunteers who put the important and necessary work of the Association ahead of their personal safety. We have all been tested negative for the Covid-19 virus. We wear masks when we cannot practice social distancing and the offices are disinfected daily. Keeping the offices closed to the public has limited our exposure and we will continue to make safety our number one priority.

Budget: The Board has been working diligently on the 2021 budget and so far, it looks like we may only have a very small increase in the Monthly Maintenance. Our insurance alone has increased 12%!

Sales and Rentals: Interest is high in residing in our Community. We have been very successful in completing a record number of sales and leases in the past 6 months. We have put the Application for Residency on our website. Due to Covid-19, applications must be submitted via FedEx, UPS or US Postal Service only. We have been conducting interviews via telephone. When we open the offices, we will contact the new owners to get their identification cards and fobs.

Business Operations: Board members have taken on new responsibilities and we have worked to develop standard practices that streamline all our processes. We are working almost electronically with telephones and computers. If you must reach us, email is the best way as we do not have a volunteer to answer the phone on a regular basis. Email addresses are listed on the next page in this Newsletter. In our efforts to modernize operations and function along the lines of a management company, we will need to move into the digital age. We are fortunate to have a wonderful volunteer, Jeff Bender, who has years of experience in IT development and maintenance. Jeff has dedicated hours of his time to research management software that will enable us to work smarter now and in the future. We hope to completely digitize our operations in 2021. Upgrading our software will keep costs down and standardize operations for all future board members.

Exterior Home Maintenance: For the past year, volunteers have been walking around our Community and identifying those homes that need a little attention before a sale or lease is completed. Homeowners are sent photos and must complete the work before a sale or lease is approved. This has been very successful. We are looking to expand

this program. With a Community of 1359 homes, we have some homes that have not been maintained properly and we will now remind the homeowner of their responsibility for up-keep. The Association assumes no responsibility for repair of any alterations, improvements, or modifications. Many homeowners have agreed to volunteer to help and we can always use more. Please contact me if you are interested. Please see the Home Inspection Report on page 33 of this issue and walk around your home, you may need to give it some attention. If you are notified, please let us know if you need more time to complete the work. We understand that it may be difficult during Covid-19.

Repairs and Restoration - Main Clubhouse: We finally received the money from Hurricane Irma for the roof replacement and it should be completed by the time this is published. We can now move forward to repair and renovate the second-floor rooms that were damaged from multiple roof leaks. Maintenance staff has been kept busy repairing and upgrading all the rooms. Room 111 is completed, and the large TV installed with a DVD player for exercise classes. All the business offices have been painted, floors stripped, LED lighting installed, and broken furniture replaced. The parking lot has been resealed and restriped. We repayed the entire driveway up to the back entrance. We had the ground leveled with new poured concrete at the back entrance and put in barrier bollards for safety. We removed old and damaged drains and installed new scuppers and downspouts for better drainage. We painted the back of the building that was scarred with water and dirt and peeling paint. Water draining from the roof is now directed under the walkway safely. We built a retaining wall on the slope and put in plants and trees. We removed multiple tree stumps left over from hurricane damage and installed additional dirt and sod. There is a new roof on the gazebo that was damaged from termites. We also added motion lights for safety.

Satellite Clubhouse: We have started upgrading, repairing, and renovating this room that was mostly being used for storage. This will enable us to move the exercise room there and increase the number of machines and equipment. We hope this will reduce the long wait times and decrease overcrowding. We have seen a large increase in the use of the gym over the past year and moving the gym to the satellite clubhouse with more space for everyone to work out safely is a good thing. There will be designated parking and available showers. Security in the satellite clubhouse has been upgraded and we will be installing new accessible doors at the entrance.

Pool Patio: The design is complete now that the donated plants and large blue ceramic pots have arrived. For safety we will have to install a low, safe hedge around the border where there is a 5-inch drop. We will install the umbrellas after the hurricane season when we can also have a dedication ceremony. We thank all our donors.

FROM THE TREASURER'S DESK

The new year is upon us, and the Lauderdale West maintenance assessment amount will change. At this writing, the amount has not been determined so check your maintenance coupon book (when it arrives), TV channel 901 or the LW Website for the updated amount. Those LW owners set up on auto or bill pay should update the amount their bank or credit card remits. LW owners using the LW auto pay service with Juda Eskew Accounting can relax; we'll update the amount automatically!

Automatic payment of your monthly assessment through our accountants will prevent this problem. Get on board. Fill out the form on Page 7 and get it back to us.

Some of our LW owners think the monthly maintenance assessment is due before the 10th of the month. That is incorrect. The assessment is due on or before the 1st of each month. A late fee will be charged if the payment is received after the 10th of the month.

We are updating our database files and need all LW Single Family Homeowners to confirm to us that their Homeowners Insurance is current. Our documents mandate that each Single Family Home owner has the required HO-3 policy.

The easiest way to confirm to us that you have the required policy is to have your insurance company or broker add Lauderdale West as an additional interest (not additional insured) to the policy. Usually at no cost.

If you have any problem adding LW to your policy just send a copy of the Declaration Page to the same address.

PEST CONTROL – Perimeter spraying of houses, duplexes and quads is performed every Wednesday. There are two (2) technicians working; one sprays the front and the other sprays the back and sides of each building. Each quadrant is complete before they start another one.

Once again, with the rainy season comes ANTS!! Beach Environmental is aware of this. They have adjusted the chemicals to compensate for this issue and are working diligently to take care of it.

Prior to termite tenting, your property will be inspected, and you will be notified of issues surrounding your property that must be addressed.

Edna, in the maintenance department, is **NOT** the person to call if you have an interior pest issue. She is always inundated with service calls as our residents call

her for assistance with ant issues. Please, do not call her. She cannot help you with interior pest problems!

Beach Environmental offers our residents a special price of \$12.00 per month if you would like interior spraying. Call them at (954) 458-1104. Of course, if you prefer to use any other pest control company, you certainly can do that too, at your own expense.

IRRIGATION – The 20-year-old Pump #1 died. We had it pulled and sent to a company that rewinds pumps for repair. We were without sprinkling for about a week. Fortunately, during that time it rained every day, so our lawns were very well watered. Pump #1 is back in its place and is ready to work for another 20 years.

LANDSCAPING – Holidays are approaching, and residents are decorating their homes including the lawns. Please understand, lawn maintenance will not move your decorations; they will mow around them so the lawn will look a little uneven when the decorations are removed. Note that EDJ and LW are not responsible for any damage caused to your decorations.

COMMUNICATING WITH THE BOARD



With the proliferation of the internet and text messaging, we often expect instant communication and responses. This is especially true of owner communications with the Lauderdale West Board. Because your communications to the Board may raise certain legal issues for not responding timely, and sometimes emails end up in spam filters, the Association must insist on certain formalities regarding communication.

Requests to inspect documents and written inquiries by owners cannot be sent via email or text messages to the Board. Instead, the request must be in writing on paper. If it is a document request (e.g., I want to see the financials for December), it need not be sent via certified mail. The Board will set up an appointment within ten (10) business days of receipt of the letter. Please note that the Association is not obligated to provide you with copies, but merely to allow you to review the document(s). If you wish something copied, you will be charged twenty-five cents per page. If it is a written inquiry (e.g., Why did we choose Contractor A vs Contractor B for this project?), it needs to be sent to the Board via certified mail. The Board will respond within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt, unless one of the statutory extensions applies.

The Lauderdale West Board of Directors cannot take any action on information provided in a letter, voice mail or phone call without the name and LW address of the person making the report.

COVID-19 UPDATE

We had high hopes of opening the satellite pool last month. Marlene Newman and her group of volunteers worked very hard to make that happen. Unfortunately, we are not able to open the satellite pool at this time. Just to quash any rumors that may be circulating, the reason is this: we have confirmed that in a complex close to Lauderdale West there were two cases of Covid. A woman and her husband became ill and were rushed to the hospital, where she died and he is in critical condition. Both tested positive for Covid and had been using the pool at their facility. Now everyone who was in that pool must be tested and we pray no one else contracts the virus. Just to be clear, this did NOT happen at Lauderdale West, but is reason to be cautious.

We, the Board, have to be very cautious with this pandemic. We are a 55 and over community and are more susceptible to contract Covid-19. Our responsibility is to all our residents.

There is also the liability issue to Lauderdale West if someone does contract the virus, goes to the pool or another LW activity and spreads the virus. Our job is to protect the Association.

As you are probably aware since the Governor has reopened the State we must still abide by Broward County guidance and rules. The number of cases continues to increase. We must err on the side of caution and keep our facilities closed at this point. It may not be a popular decision, but it is the right decision.

FYI BY PLANTATION CODE

You need a City of Plantation permit to make any plumbing or electrical changes. Don't forget you also need to complete the paperwork with our Director in charge of modifications, Kristi Woods. LW is not responsible to fix a problem if you did not get approval and a permit.

A permit ensures a plumbing or electrical change is done properly – to code. It is for your protection.

ROOM RENTAL PROCEDURE

Lauderdale West only rents out room 113 for immediate family functions for up to 70 people. The cost to rent room 113 is \$100; set up and cleanup is \$50; security deposit is \$500, payable in three separate checks.

The paperwork required to rent room 113 is as follows: photo ID; Declaration page for your Homeowners/Renters Insurance; three checks as stated above.

If you are interested, please call the Clubhouse any morning from 9 AM until noon and you will be directed to the room coordinator.

BULK & GARBAGE PICKUP



Bulk Pickup: Tuesday, December 15, 2020 Tuesday, January 11, 2021

Please DO NOT put Bulk Pick Up items out until Monday afternoon AFTER 5 PM the day before bulk pickup is scheduled. LW does not need to look like a dumping ground. Place bulk pick up AWAY from the mailboxes, trees, and street signs.

Thank you for your cooperation.

BULK PICKUP – Our next bulk pickups will be Tuesday, December 15 and Tuesday, January 11. The following items will not be accepted: electronics, glass, mirrors, paint cans, x-rays, construction materials. (For disposal of these items, refer to the article on Household Hazardous Waste & Electronic Recycling on page 12). If items are small enough, they must be put in clear bags. Black bags will not be accepted. Empty cardboard boxes will be accepted.

GARBAGE PICKUP – On Tuesday - blue bags and clear recycle bags. On Friday – blue bags only. Bags should not be put out until **5 PM** the night before pickup.

BUYER BEWARE OF UN-LICENSED WORKERS

When you need to hire someone to do work in your home, be sure to check their insurance and license. The person/company needs to have a recent license issued by the City of Plantation if their business is in the City. Be sure to see a copy of their insurance to confirm they have coverage.

Many jobs require a permit from the City of Plantation. It is important that you do your research. Call the City before work begins to determine if you need a permit. **DO NOT** rely on your contractor to inform you of that fact.

Whatever you do, **NEVER** hire someone who just knocks on your door and offers to do work for you. This decision may cost you in the long run for poor workmanship and problems that could arise for which they cannot fix/pay. They may scam you and cause more damage to your property.

Do not wait until there is a problem and wish you had hired a licensed/insured worker.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION

LANDLORDS Please remember that you cannot rent your property until you have owned it for one year. All tenants must complete an Application for Residency which is available on our Website. All leases and lease renewals must be approved by the Board before the tenant can move in. Contact Director Ermina Goodwin for additional information.

MAILBOX SAFETY We recommend that you do not place any outgoing mail in the mailbox in front of your home. We are aware of individuals removing that mail. You can safely deposit your outgoing mail in the blue Postal Service Mailbox located at the end of the parking lot of the Clubhouse or bring it directly to any US Post Office. Incoming mail should be removed from your mailbox at your first opportunity.

MODIFICATIONS If you are planning to make any changes to your home, you must complete an Application for Modifications. All modifications must be approved by the Board before any work is started. Modifications may include A/C, windows, doors, patios, enclosures, electrical, plumbing, and widening of driveways. The City of Plantation requires permits for most modifications which includes plumbing and electrical work. Contact Director Kristi Woods for additional information.

PARKING Overnight parking is not permitted on any street in Lauderdale West. Parking at the Main Clubhouse and the Satellite Clubhouse is limited to those using the clubhouse facilities, the pools/spas or the tennis courts. Other parking requires written Board approval, and a limited parking permit is available. Follow the directional arrows in all parking lots to avoid a fine. Contact Director Jennie Lipari for additional information. A notice will be placed on illegally parked vehicles before being towed at the vehicle owner's expense.

SPEEDING The speed limit in Lauderdale West is 25 miles per hour. All our walkers and bike riders have the right of way. Slow down when you see them. Stop at all stop signs. Signal for all turns. Follow the directional arrows in all parking lots and drive slowly. Driving through the parking lots as a short cut is not permitted. Violators will be fined. Plantation police are asked to monitor our roadways.

TRASH All trash must be placed in City of Plantation blue bags. Trash pickup is on Tuesdays and Fridays. You are permitted to place trash out after 5 PM the night before.

RECYCLE All recycle items must be placed in City of Plantation clear bags or paper bags. Recycle pickup is on Tuesdays only. Boxes must be flattened first and placed alongside the clear bags.

BULK PICKUP You may put large bulk items at the curb on the second Tuesday of the month only. Please see the Newsletter for the exact date. Black bags will not be picked up.

UNAUTHORIZED

SIGNS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON LAUDERDALE WEST PROPERTY

SIGNS ... of any kind, are NOT permitted on Lauderdale West property, except during elections. Candidates' signs may be erected 10 days prior to an election and must be removed within 7 days after an election. Lauderdale West property includes all areas outside your home. This includes any grassy areas, your driveway, any public area, including stop signs, trees, and utility poles. Signs for Open Houses, Garage Sales, Parties, Greetings, etc. **are not allowed.**

Signs will be removed, and the owner will be subject to fines.

GUTTERS

All gutters are the responsibility of the owner. They must be kept clean both inside and out — meaning the owner must remove, on a regular basis, all leaves and trees that may be growing out of the gutters. If the debris in the gutter causes damage to your roof or fascia board, you will be held responsible for all repair costs.

Gutters should be cleaned every other month especially if you have trees near your homes.

PLUMBING PROBLEMS

To avoid plumbing problems, **DO NOT** flush cigarette butts, flushable cleaning wipes, paper or cloth towels or diapers. Please, **ONLY** flush toilet paper.





WATER SHUT-OFF VALVES

If you are remodeling a kitchen

or bathroom, it is your contractor's responsibility to move the water shut-off valves for easy access.


ROOFS NO ONE is permitted on your roof EXCEPT LW APPROVED contractors. If you hire a contractor to clean or repair your roof, and they damage your roof in any way, you are responsible for any and all repair costs.

ATTENTION ALL ANIMAL OWNERS!

Lauderdale West is a NO PET Community. The Board continues to receive complaints about the increase in the number of animals on our property and residents who do not leash or clean up after their animals. Animal noise, i.e. barking, crowing, etc. has also become an issue and is creating a nuisance in the Community.

SERVICE AND EMOTIONAL SUPPORT ANIMALS

Service and emotional support animals are not considered pets, so restrictions that apply to pets do not necessarily apply to them. Emotional support animals are companion animals that provide therapeutic benefits for people with mental disabilities or medical issues. These animals do not have to be trained, unlike service animals that are trained individually to perform specific tasks to help a person who is disabled. You must not discriminate against someone with one of these animals any more than someone with a wheelchair.

IF YOU REQUIRE THE SERVICES OF A SUPPORT OR COMFORT ANIMAL

In Lauderdale West, you have obligations you must abide by in order to receive written Board approval to have the animal in your home. There are new laws in Florida for assistance animals. For each animal, you will be required to sign and have notarized a Request for Animal Accommodation stating you understand your responsibility as an animal owner and to provide accompanying documentation such as:

- · Register your pet with the Applications and Approvals office.
- A doctor's letter stating your need for such an animal.
- A current dog license.
- Proof that vaccinations/shots are up to date for your animal.
- All animals must be personally attended to and on a leash when outside the home. They may not be tethered to a tree, porch or patio.
- A homeowner's insurance policy with liability coverage.
- If the animal poses a nuisance or threat to the Community, it must be removed.

In addition to the foregoing, animal owners **must**:

- Be responsible for animals that reside in their home.
- Follow all City and County Ordinances.
- Clean up after their animal anywhere in Lauderdale West. Be advised, you must properly dispose of the bag of animal waste in **your** trash container, not in a Community trash can. Do not put it down a drainage grate or throw it in the lakes or canals. This becomes a bacterial hazard to our water system.

By following these guidelines, everyone benefits including your pet. Failure to register and meet the above requirements will result in fines. Thank you for your cooperation.




BE COURTEOUS!

I think you can do anything. As a child I can remember how amazed I was to see you transform our concrete basement into a living space with walls, lights, a bathroom, and kitchen. From nothing you made a place for us to enjoy and invite our friends.

When I was growing up you worked late every night, and on weekends Mom always had some project for you to do. When you retired it was wonderful to see you enjoy so many activities and make so many friends.

You have always been dependable, open-minded, a great problem solver, a fair and scrupulously honest man who is always ready to help others. I would like to thank you for being a great father, and to tell you again how much I love and respect you.



NEW INFORMATION!

The painters have completed their contract for painting and roof cleaning for 2020 and tile roof cleaning is on hold until 2021. However, if you would like your tile roof cleaned in early 2021, please see the information below.

Single family homeowners who would like to have their tile roof cleaned may do so at their expense if your roof is not scheduled to be cleaned or your house painted in 2021.

Auld Lang Syne



tional folk song. It is well known in many countries, especially in the English-speaking world, its traditional use being to bid farewell to the old year at the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve.

The poem's Scots title may be translated into standard English as "old long since" or, less literally, "long, long ago", "days gone by", "times long past", or "old times". Consequently, "For auld lang syne", as it appears in the first line of the chorus, might be loosely translated as "for the sake of old times".

Canadian band leader Guy Lombardo made "Auld Lang Syne" an institution. From 1929 until 1976, first on radio and then on television, Americans tuned in to the New Year's Eve broadcast by Guy Lombardo and the Royal Canadians. By the mid-70s, Lombardo's broadcasts began to face serious competition from Dick Clark's "New Year's Rockin' Eve," which was positioned to attract younger viewers and emphasized the rock element to contrast with the Royal Canadians' big band tunes. But for decades, Lombardo owned December 31 — even earning the nickname "Mr. New Year's Eve" — and every single year he played "Auld Lang Syne" to ring in the new year.

Rules & Hours

SWIMMING POOL HOURS

As our days become shorter, our pool hours are adjusted accordingly. The rule of thumb is that the pool is open from dawn to dusk and you must leave the pool area by that time. However due to Covid-19 restrictions, the satellite pool is open for exercise only and you must make a reservation with Marlene – 943-474-5225. Thank you.

SWIMMING POOL RULES

This is just a reminder that when the pools open, everyone must follow the posted pool rules, especially:

- Do not prop open a pool area gate
- Shower **BEFORE** entering the pool as this is a Health Department regulation
- Allow residents who are swimming laps the right of way if you are just standing, walking, or talking in the pool
- No diving is allowed
- Children must be supervised by an adult, at all times, in the pool area, especially when they are in the water –
 THERE IS NO LIFEGUARD ON DUTY
- No child under the age of 16 is allowed in the spa/hot tub
- No jumping, running or loud noise in the pool area
- No food, drink or glass is allowed in the pool area
- Vacate the pool area during rain, thunder or lightning sitting under the metal awnings is dangerous
- Incontinent or non-trained individuals must wear swim diapers
- No smoking or vaping is allowed in the pool area

The Lauderdale West Community Association reserves the right to deny the use of the pool or pool area to anyone at any time for just cause.

Because of your lazy and inconsiderate behavior it may become necessary to enforce the Lauderdale West declaration of being a pet free community.

During WWII, U.S. Airplanes were armed with belts of ammo, which they would shoot during dogfights and on strafing runs. Some paintings of George Washington have him standing behind a desk with one arm behind his back while others showed both legs and both arms. Prices charged by painters were not based on how many people were to be painted, but by how many limbs were to be painted.

Arms and legs are 'limbs,' therefore painting them would cost the buyer more. Hence the expression, 'Okay, but it'll cost you an arm and a leg.' (Artists know hands and arms are more difficult to paint.)

WHERE IS MY 2021 HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION?

The tax bill you received this November from the Broward County Tax Collector is for the 2020 tax year. If you purchased your home in 2020 and the previous owners of your new home were entitled to and received Homestead Exemption or any other exemption on January 1, 2020, you may have inherited their exemptions on your 2020 property tax bill. Florida Statutes require these 2020 exemptions be removed for 2021 and the property be reassessed at the 2021 just value. This will often result in an increase in your 2021 property taxes so it is important you apply for 2021 Homestead Exemption and any other exemptions for which you may qualify. Your new 2021 Homestead Exemption will be reflected next year on all 2021 property records, notices, and tax bills. Any exemptions applied to the tax bill are totaled and shown in the third column "Exemptions" on the individual tax bill.

emption or other tax-saving exemptions, please contact our Customer Service Department at 954-357-6830.

ESCROW ADJUSTMENTS FOR 2020 TAX BILLS

The Property Appraiser's Office does not handle anything related to the financing of property. If you make monthly escrow payments for your property taxes, your mortgage or escrow company typically does an escrow analysis after paying your annual tax bill. Any changes to your monthly payment will be determined and they will notify you. Should you have any questions about this, you should contact your mortgage company directly for assistance.

QUARTERLY INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS

If you pay your property taxes through Broward County's quarterly installment plan, any newly approved 2020 exemptions will be applied on the 3rd and 4th installment payment amounts. Any adjustments for 2020 are made on the final two quarterly 2020 installment payments.

Fraud Prevention Checklist

Keep your account(s) secure: What you can do now to help fight fraud.

1. Use your bank's mobile app

• The mobile app is the best way for you to stay on top of any suspicious account activity. You should be able to set up alerts, lock or unlock your card, dispute a transaction and more through their mobile application.

2. Check your contact information

- You're not the only one protecting your account. Your bank and credit card company are working to protect you. If they spot an issue, they want to get in touch with you the quickest way possible.
- Provide your mobile number so they can alert you to potential fraud.

3. Create a strong unique password

- Strong passwords are 8 or more characters long and include a combination of numbers, symbols and upper- and lowercase letters.
- · Use multifactor authentication when possible.

4. Protect your devices

• Keep your phone, tablet and computer up to date with the latest browser, operating system and antivirus software.

5. Keep your account information secure

- Go paperless.
- · Never write your PIN on the back of your card.
- Use trusted online payment methods, such as Bill Pay or Zelle ® instead of writing checks.

6. Know the red flags that signal a scam

- Scammers pressure people to send money, threaten law enforcement action or demand gift cards as a form of payment.
- Remember, if you provide your information or send money to a scammer, there is often little your financial institution can do to help get your money back.

7. Fight fraud with these quick tips

- **Do not share your information.** Your financial institution will never ask you to give personal information in an email, text, or non-secure website.
- **Do not click on suspicious links.** Be wary of unsolicited links from unknown sources.
- **Do not be intimidated.** Scams often try to create urgency or alarm by threatening to close or suspend your account if you don't take immediate action.
- **Do not be fooled.** Never transfer money to someone's account claiming that they need the money for urgent help or protection.
- **Do not share security codes.** If your financial institution sends you a security code by text or email to confirm your identity, never share it with anyone else.

CHRISTMAS TRIVIA

- Christmas, the holiday commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ, is celebrated by a majority of Christians on December 25 in the Gregorian calendar. But early Christians did not celebrate his birth, and no one knows on which date Jesus was actually born.

- The poem "Twas the Night Before Christmas" was originally titled "A Visit from St. Nicholas.
- NORAD (North American Aerospace Defense Command) first started tracking Santa on Christmas Eve on December 24, 1955 and has continued every year since. In 2004 Google started tracking Santa as well.

HANUKKAH TRIVIA

- There are 16 ways to spell Hanukkah. Since Hanukkah is transliterated from Hebrew letters, there are many different ways to spell the name of the holiday. The most common in English are "Hanukkah" or "Chanukah."
- Jimmy Carter was the first president to take official notice of the holiday in 1979, and each President since has recognized Hanukkah with a special menorah-lighting ceremony.
- There is a right direction to light the candles. Hanukkah candles are added right to left, but lit left to right so the newest is lit first.
- Studying the Torah was outlawed in ancient Greece, so the Jewish people played with the dreidel in order to fool the Greeks if they were caught.
- A million donuts are eaten in Israel during Hannukah. Israelis feast on "sufganiyot", oily jelly donuts, as the traditional holiday dessert.
- A menorah is actually a "hanukiah". An actual menorah has seven placeholders (for candles) all at the same height. A Hanukkiah has nine placeholders, with one at a different height.
- Latkes, sufganiyot (jelly doughnuts), apple fritters, kugel when you think of the food served at Hanukkah most of them are fried. This isn't a coincidence; people fry their food in oil for Hanukkah as a symbol for the miracle oil that burned for eight nights straight.



Kwanzaa is a weeklong celebration (December 26, 2020 to January 1, 2021) held in the United States that honors African heritage in African-American culture. Celebrations often include singing and dancing, storytelling, poetry reading, African drumming, and feasting. Dr. Maulana Karenga introduced the festival in 1966 to the United States as a ritual to welcome the first harvests to the home. Dr. Maulana Karenga created seven guiding principles to be discussed during the week of Kwanzaa.

The seven principles (nguzo saba) of Kwanzaa utilize Kiswahili words: unity (umoja), self-determination (kujichagulia), collective work and responsibility (ujima), cooperative economics (ujamaa), purpose (nia), creativity (kuumba), and faith (imani). Each of the seven candles signify the principles.

AT HOME AND ON THE ROAD FROM AAA

You wouldn't leave your house unlocked when you go on vacation, but are you protecting your online identity when you travel? Here are some tips from AAA Chief Information Security Officer, Gopal Padinjaruveetil.

- **Use advanced protection:** Enable multifactor authentication such as a one-time logic code sent to your smartphone for accounts like Facebook, Google and Drop Box.
- Turn off Bluetooth when not in use: Bluetooth-enabled accessories such as earpieces and external keyboards are convenient, but cybercriminals can pair with your phone's open Bluetooth connection and use it to steal personal information.
- **Don't fall for phishing scams:** Phishing scams use attractive offers to entice shoppers to click on links within emails. If you receive an email with a deal that looks too

good to be true, or if it has a link or attachment that seems suspicious, don't click on it.

- Avoid public Wi-Fi networks: Conducting personal business, like online banking or shopping on public networks, can allow attackers to intercept your information. To check your credit card statement or shop online while traveling, switch to your mobile device's data internet connection.
- Keep your device software updated: And while you're at it, make sure you have good anti-virus and anti-malware software on your devices.
- **Don't connect your mobile device:** Connecting to any computer or charging station that you do not control, such as a charging station at an airport terminal or a shared computer in a library, with a USB cable can allow software running on that computer to access your sensitive data or install new software on your device.

Take precautions to make sure you always keep your online identity safe.



NEW YEAR'S EVE TRIVIA

Check out these interesting fun facts and trivia about New Year's Eve.

- According to statistics from the National Insurance Crime Bureau, more vehicles are stolen on New Year's Day than on any other holiday throughout the year.
- Why should you ring in the New Year with family and friends? It is thought that the first visitors you see after ringing in the New Year would bring you good or bad luck, depending on who you keep as friends and enemies. Keep your friends close and your enemies far, far away!
- The Times Square New Year's Eve Ball came about as a result of a ban on fireworks. The first ball, in 1907, was an illuminated 700-pound iron and wood ball adorned with one hundred 25-watt light bulbs. Today, the round ball designed by Waterford Crystal, weighs 11,875-pounds, is 12 feet in diameter and is bedazzled with 2,668 Waterford crystals.
- Due to wartime restrictions, the New Year's Eve ball was not lowered in 1942 and 1943.
- Throughout the year, visitors to Times Square in New York City write their New Year's wishes on pieces of official Times Square New Year's Eve confetti. At the end of the year, the wishes are collected and added to the one ton of confetti that showers the crowd gathered in Times Square in celebration of the New Year.

- The top three destinations in the United States to ring in the New Year are Las Vegas, Disney World and New York City.
- Food plays a big role in New Year's traditions. Eating black-eyed peas, ham or cabbage are thought to bring prosperity. However, stay away from bad luck foods like lobsters, because they move backwards, and chicken, because they scratch in reverse. It is believed that eating these on New Year's Day might cause a reversal of fortune.
- In Colombia, Cuba and Puerto Rico families stuff a life-size male doll called Mr. Old Year with memories of the outgoing year and dress him in old clothes from each family member.
 At midnight he is set on fire - thus burning away the bad memories of the year.
- According to this survey, 40 to 45 percent of American adults make one or more resolutions each year. The top New Year's resolutions include weight loss, exercise, quitting smoking and better money management. By the second week of January, 25 percent of people have abandoned their resolutions.

Here are 7 rules to live by:

1. "EMPTY AND CLEAN IF YOU WANT TO BE GREEN"

Do not contaminate other recycling materials with food particles and liquids. This can damage containers and make them unfit to be recycled.

2. "DON'T BAG RECYCLABLES"

Only put loose items into recycling. The recycling facility does not have time to until bags, so they will be sent to the landfill.

3. "COATED PAPER CAUSES PROBLEMS"

Waxy paper cups and shiny or sparkly gift bags are examples of coated paper. If they have been treated or coated, they cannot be recycled.

4. "GREASE IS GROSS"

Oil and water don't mix; when the grease from your recyclables transfers to other paper goods, it can spoil the batch of mulch at the paper mill. Parts soiled by grease should be cut out of paper materials. Toss only clean card-board into recycling.

5. "IF IT TANGLES, THEN IT MANGLES"

Tanglers are items that can get stuck in the equipment at a recycling facility. Don't recycle ropes, strapping, zip-ties, hoses, wires, chains, cords.

6. "DON'T BE A DANGEROUS DUMPER"

Certain items can be dangerous when mixed with recycling: batteries, light bulbs, medications and lighter fluids are examples of unsafe items.

7. "IF IN DOUBT, THROW IT OUT"

Do not add to the financial and environmental cost of trucking garbage from recycling facilities to landfills.



The 7 Steps to THE PRICE OF A GOOD LIFE

At home, amid concerns of the Korean War, young couples continued their migration to new homes. Many of these houses were prefabricated and located in the outlying areas of their communities. This lifestyle added a new word to the nation's vocabulary – "suburbia."

The typical suburban house was ranch-style, generally with two bedrooms and an attic that could be converted to two more bedrooms and a bath. Prices ranged from about \$8,000 to \$11,500 – with major appliances usually included.

Those prices were typical on the East Coast. On the West Coast – in Seattle, for example – you could buy a home built of masonry block for \$4,000 including the lot.

In most areas of the country you could get a government-guaranteed mortgage for a 5 percent down payment (veterans didn't have to put anything down), with 30 years to pay. The monthly payment came to about \$56.

To furnish that home, you needed to budget your money so you could buy big-ticket items – such as a two-piece living room suite for \$157, a seven-piece dining room set for \$149 or a three-piece bedroom set for \$139!

Expert Window Cleaning Tricks

Window cleaning can be a tedious chore. You'll be surprised to know that you can save a ton of your precious time and energy on cleaning windows when equipped with the right tips and tricks.

1. Clean Set-In Stains

The first step to cleaning windows is assessing your windows for stains. Usually, windows suffer from hard water spots that seem impossible to remove. But it's not as tough as it may seem. An easy way to get rid of stubborn stains is by applying a mixture of half water and half vinegar. Soak a clean towel in the prepared solution and gently rub the towel over the rough spots on the window. Keep wiping until the spots fade away.

2. Get Rid of Decals or Stickers

Removing stickers or decals from a window can be challenging. But all you need is a spray window cleaner and a sharp blade to remove them from your windows. Spray a good amount of window cleaner on the sticker and around it. Using a scraper, chip away the sticker/decals slowly. If you don't have a window cleaner, you can use rubbing alcohol instead. Apply rubbing alcohol and wait for a few minutes before getting rid of the sticky items from your window.

3. Clean the Screens, Inside and Out

Every time you clean the window, make sure to clean its screen from the inside and outside. First, detach it from your window and dust away the dirt using a clean cloth. Now, lightly spray both sides of the screen with water. Using a clean sponge or a lint-free cloth, wipe down the dirt and grime using a warm water and vinegar mixture. You can also use dish soap

instead of vinegar. Air-dry it completely before reinstalling.

4. Clean the Window Thoroughly

Now comes the main part – cleaning the window!

Make sure you wipe all the dust and debris from all the corners and window frames.

The rubber blade of your squeegee should be in contact with the window. While cleaning the window, press the rubber blade firmly against the window and then wipe down the entire window.

If you have small windowpanes, you can use a sponge. But if you have big windows, go for a squeegee. Dip your cleaning tool into the bucket filled with your preferred cleaner. You have various options when it comes to preparing a nice cleaning solution. Here are a few of them:

- Mix two gallons of water with one teaspoon of dishwashing soap
- Mix four tablespoons of rubbing alcohol and vinegar, one tablespoon of cornstarch, and two cups of water
- Mix water and white vinegar in equal measure
- Mix $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of dishwasher rinse liquid, 4 tablespoons of rubbing alcohol, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of ammonia, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of dishwashing detergent and 2 gallons of water.

5. Dry Out Your Windows

Once you have cleaned your windows with an effective window cleaner, wipe your windows with a dry cloth. Work your way from top to bottom, horizontally. Make sure you use a lint-free cloth to avoid putting any unwanted marks on your window. Go for a microfiber cloth as it soaks up the water and leaves no stain on the glass.
