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PRESIDENT

Dear Homeowners:

While I write this in August, I had hoped that this nightmare Covid-19 pandemic would be over; but after reading the headlines this morning, it looks like we will still be dealing with facial coverings, social distancing and self-quarantine as you read this. I hope that everyone is healthy and safe.

The Board continues to come into the office to work daily. We follow all the required protocols to keep us safe and healthy. The office remains closed to the public to reduce any risk to us as business has been going on as usual. We now have a volunteer on Mondays to answer the phone, but email is still the best way to reach us. Email addresses are listed in this newsletter on page 5.

At the beginning of this pandemic, when Broward County issued its Emergency Order, we closed all facilities including pools and spas to residents. This was a difficult decision because we were approaching the summer heat season. Many of you were understandably upset that your Board had the right to do so. Board members provide leadership for the Community. The Board of Directors is responsible for the management of the Community; that is, to protect the property and its value, maintain the common elements of the Association, and enforce the restrictions and covenants in the governing documents. We have a fiduciary duty to comply with the law and we will remain closed until Broward County rescinds the restrictions of the Emergency Order. We also received requests to "reduce the maintenance or give refunds" because residents were not able to use the "amenities" as they called them. At this time there is no discussion in regard to reducing the monthly maintenance assessment fee for homeowners.

The amount of money you owe the Association monthly is determined by the approved 2020 budget even if the "amenities" are not available. Here are just a few of the items your maintenance assessments fund:

- General Maintenance. The facilities must be cleaned daily and at present disinfected, whether or not they are open to the public.
- Federal, State and Local taxes, fees and licenses must be paid. Uncle Sam still wants his money.
- Utilities such as electricity and water usage bills must be paid. The lights are on and the toilets are running.
- Maintenance Staff Salaries. Our staff is full time and they are utilized to repair fascia and exterior home stucco. We have a home painting schedule that we adhere to as per the budget. We are also continuing to repair and replace

roofs. Our maintenance staff works on the portions that are not covered by the roofer but are affected by the roof. Also they are all working to renovate the infrastructure in the main clubhouse. We have completed room 111 and removed 25-year-old wallpaper and carpet. We replaced all the lighting with LED fixtures that will reduce our electric bills. We are fortunate that we have capable staff to do this work. It is labor intensive, and this is the opportune time because they are unable to enter any homes for minor plumbing or electrical repairs. Our staff continues to follow all Covid-19 guidelines.

- Lawn Maintenance. We continue to water, fertilize, and exterminate our lawns on a regular schedule. We also maintain all the planting beds and trimming of the hedges around our facilities. This is Florida and everything grows fast.
- Pool Maintenance. The pools and spas must be maintained and cleaned regularly whether they are open to the public or not. This is a Florida Department of Heath requirement. We have some pool pump issues as well as a leak in the main pool. These problems are being addressed at present and we are in the permit processing stage for the future main pool renovation.
- Tennis Courts. We power wash all the tennis courts and completed a percolation test which was needed for us to address the poor drainage issue on the courts. Mold grows if we do not perform regular maintenance.
- Cable TV and Internet Service is now provided by Blue Stream with free installation and fast internet speed.
- Pest control is performed monthly to the exterior of your home as well as the entire property in our community. This helps to reduce the annoying bugs while sitting on our porches and patios.

As you can see, we are still spending the monthly maintenance assessment we collect in accordance with the approved fiscal budget for 2020. What most people do not understand is that the Association is not a vendor and all of us own a portion of the common areas in addition to your individual home and we are all responsible for the upkeep. The maintenance assessment is money we collect for this upkeep. This ensures that we maintain property values, protect our investment, and enhance the Community in which we live.

On the bright side, we have completed the pool patio at the main clubhouse. This was done completely with donations and was created for the convenience of those who wish to have a light snack while at the pool. As you know, no food is permitted in the pool area. We also hope it will be a gathering spot for neighbors to meet outside their homes.

Be healthy and safe.

DIRECTORS' Corner

Beach Environmental is our pest control company. During these past 8 months, they have proven to be very successful in keeping insects, termites, and critters away from our houses. However, they cannot beat Mother Nature. Little black ants always find their way into our homes, especially during the rainy season. As Beach does their best maintaining the outside or our homes, we must be diligent in maintaining the inside of our homes. It only takes a second for these little black ants to find a crumb we may have left on the floor or countertops; and when they find the crumb, they invite all their friends in for a feast.

Beach Environmental is on our property every Wednesday. They spray the perimeter of our houses. I have addressed the issue of these little black ants with them, and they are spraying diligently.

Tero Bait Boxes are very effective. You can buy these at Home Depot. If you prefer to have the inside of your home sprayed, Beach Environmental offers our residents a special price of \$12.00. Call them at (954) 458-1104. Of course, if you prefer to use any other pest control company, you certainly can do that too.

Edna, in the maintenance department, is NOT the person to call if you have an interior pest issue. She is always inundated with service calls. Our residents call her for assistance with ant issues. Please, do not call Edna. She cannot help you with interior pest problems!

African bees have invaded our Community. These bees are being sprayed and killed. The honey bees are endangered. They cannot be destroyed. Beach Environmental removes the hives and places them away from local communities.

Let's talk about racoons and iguanas that have made their home in Lauderdale West. Please understand, racoons were here before us. We have had many of them trapped and removed at a large cost to the Community. Please keep trash pails covered and be diligent in storing food carefully. These guys can detect food from a great distance. They are nocturnal creatures which means they usually only come out at night. Occasionally, you will see them during the day. You should stay away from them.

The iguanas are awful, but they are now part of the landscape. They dig holes in our property and lay their eggs. These critters are not endangered, and if you want to hire someone to rid your property of these critters, you may do so. It is not the responsibility of Lauderdale West. FYI: racoons eat iguana eggs.

FROM THE TREASURER'S DESK

Owners, please don't forget that the monthly maintenance assessment is due on or BEFORE the 1st of the month! When you mail or tell your bank to send the payment out on or after the 5th it does not get posted before the Late Payment date and you must pay a late fee.

Some owners continue to pay the wrong amount because they do it themselves or have their bank send it for them using last year's assessment amount. The 2020 monthly maintenance assessment for the condo/plex units is \$327.00. The SFH 2020 monthly assessment it \$337.00.

Better to setup EFT auto pay with our CPA accounting firm. It costs nothing and you will find the form on page 10. Help keep costs down by paying assessments automatically!

COMMUNICATING WITH THE BOARD



With the proliferation of the internet and text messaging, we often expect instant communication and responses. This is especially true of owner communications with the Lauderdale West Board. Because your communications to the Board may raise certain legal issues for not responding timely, and sometimes emails end up in spam filters, the Association must insist on certain formalities regarding communication with owners.

Requests to inspect documents and written inquiries by owners cannot be sent via email or text messages to the Board. Instead, the request must be in writing on paper. If it is a document request (e.g., I want to see the financials for December), it need not be sent via certified mail. The Board will set up an appointment within ten (10) business days of receipt of the letter. Please note that the Association is not obligated to provide you with copies, but merely to allow you to review the document(s). If you wish something copied, you will be charged twenty-five cents per page. If it is a written inquiry (e.g., Why did we choose Contractor A vs Contractor B for this project?), it needs to be sent to the Board via certified mail. The Board will respond within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt, unless one of the statutory extensions applies.

The Lauderdale West Board of Directors cannot take any action on information provided in a letter, voice mail or phone call without the name and LW address of the person making the report.

Have you discontinued your telephone land line and are using a cell phone instead? Do we have your correct contact information? We are asking all our residents to complete the Resident Contact Update Form on our website: www.lauder-dalewest.org. Just click on the "Resident Contact Update" tab to fill out the simple online form. The tab can be found on the main page, second tab on the left in light blue.

If you do not have access to a computer and the internet, you may obtain a form in the Administration Office at the Main Clubhouse.

It is vital that you complete the Resident Contact Update Form at your earliest opportunity in order that your information is correct and current.

REOPENING UPDATE

The Association still plans to open all amenities including the pools and the tennis courts when Broward County lifts all restrictions because of Covid-19. We continue to maintain all amenities in hopes of these restrictions being lifted soon. Currently we are unable to comply with the restrictions imposed by Broward County and the need to monitor them in our Community in order to reopen.

As you know, we are self-managed, and the members of the Board cannot monitor compliance with the restrictions.

Lauderdale West does not have the funds nor personnel to monitor the use of facial coverings, social distancing and crowd limitations of 10 persons or less. We also cannot perform the intensive disinfection of surfaces that is required after each use. This being said, we do have a fiduciary duty to protect the financial status of our Association, and we cannot afford the consequences or liability should anyone contract Covid-19 as a result of our failure to comply with the present restrictions of Broward County as well as the required monitoring.

We hope and pray the Clubhouse and all amenities will be open by the time you are reading this but unfortunately, we cannot guarantee that.



POLITICAL SIGNAGE

- 1. No more than one (1) election sign per candidate or issue for any local, county, state, national or special district election shall be permitted on private property or common ground. No election sign shall be allowed to be located on a roadway median.
- 2. Election signs shall not be illuminated nor contain any three-dimensional objects.
- 3. Election signs shall not be placed upon any property more than ten (10) calendar days before the election date to which they relate.
- 4. All election signs shall be removed within seven (7) calendar days following the election date to which they relate.
- 5. Election signs in residential zoning districts shall not exceed two (2) feet in height and two (2) feet in width.
- 6. Election signs shall be located a maximum of five (5) feet from the front of the residence or on the front patio.
- 7. No person shall post an election sign(s) or sticker(s) in, on or outside of their windows, or on their mailbox at any time, including, but not limited to, signs or stickers posted for any local, county, state, national, or special district elections. Unpermitted signs or stickers shall be subject to immediate removal by the Association.
- 8. No political/election flags may be attached to any residence. Unpermitted flags shall be subject to immediate removal by the Association.

AFRICANIZED/KILLER BEES

AFRICANIZED/KILLER BEES

have been found in Lauderdale West. If you should see them:

DO NOT Go near them, attempt to kill them or swat at them.

DO Leave the area immediately. Call Maintenance.

If stung, call 911 and seek medical attention immediately.

Africanized, killer bees are slightly smaller than honeybees and have smaller colonies. They can build nests in unique places. They have been known to live in tires, crates, boxes and empty cars. If you see a bee or wasp nest of any kind notify maintenance 954-473-2595.

Africanized bee venom is no more dangerous than regular honeybees. However, these bees tend to attack in greater numbers, which causes more danger to humans.

DEET and other insect repellents are not effective in protecting against these bees stings. To prevent stings, avoid swatting at bees. Instead, blow gently from a safe distance.

- · Please advise your tenants that they must contact you and you will contact the Maintenance Department.

Unless you have an absolute emergency, during our regular business hours, your situation will be addressed the following workday.

If you have an active plumbing leak, turn off the water shutoff valve to that sink or toilet or at the main valve outside your home or plex. If you cannot physically turn off the valve, call a neighbor or friend to do it for you. Yelling and threatening our Maintenance Staff will not get your problem addressed any sooner.

Our Lauderdale West Community has established principles of conduct for the general good and welfare of all our owners, tenants and guests. Every resident of our Lauderdale West Community has the right to live peacefully in their home and has the right to expect that the value of their property will be upheld in a reasonable manner.

The Board of Directors would like to remind everyone of the following:

- For our safety, we MUST follow parking restrictions and the directional signs in the parking lots.
- Owners are required to follow our documents and rules and regulations.
- Owners are responsible to maintain the exterior of their homes (gutters, awnings, patios, landscaping).
- Residents are not permitted to install any plants, shrubs or trees without written Board approval.
- Owners, tenants and guests are required to follow City ordinances regarding animals.
- Owners are required to seek approval for all home modifications in advance.
- Front pole lights and rear security lights must be kept on at night.
- Owners are responsible for their tenants and guests.
- Residents must respect quiet times from 10:00 PM to 8:00 AM.
- Non-adherence to the Lauderdale West documents and rules and regulations will result in the resident being fined accordingly.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW) & ELECTRONIC RECYLING

Plantation – November 21 Sunrise – October 24

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) includes paint, batteries, tires and similar materials. Electronic Materials include computers, computer monitors, televisions, printers, scanners and similar devices. Neither HHW nor Electronic Materials are collected as solid waste, recyclable, or bulk trash. The City of Planation offers four quarterly drop-off events, which allow residents to dispose of these materials. This is available for residents only; proof of residency is required. HHW drop-off events at City Public Works Compound, 750 NW 91st Avenue from 9:00 AM - 1:00 PM. Dates: November 21. The City of Plantation works in conjunction with the City of Sunrise and their site may be used as an alternative. Located at 10500 NW 55 Street, Sunrise, their date is: October 24.

BULK PICKUP – Our next bulk pickups will be Tuesday, October 13 and Tuesday, November 10. The following items will not be accepted: electronics, glass, mirrors, paint cans, x-rays, construction materials. (For disposal of these items, refer to the article on Household Hazardous Waste & Electronic Recycling on this page). If items are small enough, they must be put in clear bags. Black bags will not be accepted. Empty cardboard boxes will be accepted.

GARBAGE PICKUP – On Tuesday - blue bags and clear recycle bags. On Friday – blue bags only. Bags should not be put out until **5:00 PM** the night before pickup.

Even though Lauderdale West may be included in the title, they are NOT endorsed by and have nothing to do with Lauderdale West Community Association No. 1, Inc. BE CAUTIOUS WHEN SHARING YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION AND BE AWARE OF FALSE INFORMATION COMMUNICATED ON THESE SITES.

BUYER BEWARE OF UNLICENSED WORKERS

When you need to hire someone to do work in your home, be sure to check their insurance and license. The person/company needs to have a recent license issued by the City of Plantation if their business is in the City. Be sure to see a copy of their insurance to confirm they have coverage.

Many jobs require a permit from the City of Plantation. It is important that you do your research. Call the City before work begins to determine if you need a permit. **DO NOT** rely on your contractor to inform you of that fact.

Whatever you do, **NEVER** hire someone who just knocks on your door and offers to do work for you. This decision may cost you in the long run for poor workmanship and problems that could arise for which they cannot fix/pay. They may scam you and cause more damage to your property.

Do not wait until there is a problem and wish you had hired a licensed/insured worker.

HELPFUL INFORMATION About Living in LW

LANDLORDS Please remember that you cannot rent your property until you have owned it for one year. All tenants must complete an Application for Residency which is available on our Website. All leases and lease renewals must be approved by the Board before the tenant can move in. Contact Director Ermina Goodwin for additional information.

MAILBOX SAFETY We recommend that you do not place any outgoing mail in the mailbox in front of your home. We are aware of individuals removing that mail. You can safely deposit your outgoing mail in the blue Postal Service Mailbox located at the end of the parking lot of the Clubhouse or bring it directly to any US Post Office. Incoming mail should be removed from your mailbox at your first opportunity.

MODIFICATIONS If you are planning to make any changes to your home, you must complete an Application for Modifications. All modifications must be approved by the Board before any work is started. Modifications may include A/C, windows, doors, patios, enclosures, electrical, plumbing, and widening of driveways. The City of Plantation requires permits for most modifications which includes plumbing and electrical work. LW is not responsible for plumbing and electrical work that was done without a permit. Contact Director Kristi Woods for additional information.

PARKING Overnight parking is not permitted on any street in Lauderdale West. Parking at the Main Clubhouse and the Satellite Clubhouse is limited to those using the clubhouse facilities, the pools/spas or the tennis courts. Other parking requires written Board approval, and a limited parking permit is available. Follow the direction arrows in all parking lots to avoid a fine. Contact Director Jennie Lipari for additional information. A notice will be placed on illegally parked vehicles before being towed at the vehicle owners' expense.

SPEEDING The speed limit in Lauderdale West is 25 miles per hour. All our walkers and bike riders have the right of way. Slow down when you see them. Stop at all stop signs. Signal for all turns. Follow the direction arrows in all parking lots and drive slowly. Driving through the parking lots as a short cut is not permitted. Violators will be fined. Plantation police are asked to monitor our roadways.

TRASH All trash must be placed in City of Plantation blue bags. Trash pickup is on Tuesdays and Fridays. You are permitted to place trash out after 5 PM the night before.

RECYCLE All recycle items must be placed in City of Plantation clear bags or paper bags. Recycle pickup is on Tuesdays only. Boxes must be flattened first and placed alongside the clear bags.

BULK PICKUP You may put large bulk items at the curb on the second Tuesday of the month only. Please see the newsletter for the exact date. Black bags will not be picked up.

ROOM RENTAL PROCEDURE

Lauderdale West only rents out room 113 for immediate family functions for up to 70 people. The cost to rent room 113 is \$100; set up and cleanup is \$50; security deposit is \$500, payable in three separate checks.

The paperwork required to rent room 113 is as follows: photo ID; Declaration page for your Homeowners/Renters Insurance; three checks as stated above.

If you are interested, please call the Clubhouse any morning from 9 AM until noon and you will be directed to the room coordinator.

PLUMBING PROBLEMS

To avoid plumbing problems, **DO NOT** flush cigarette butts, flushable cleaning wipes, paper or cloth towels or diapers. Please, ONLY flush toilet paper.



WATER SHUT OFF VALVES

If you are remodeling a kitchen or bathroom, it is your contractor's responsibility to move the water shutoff valves for easy access.

ROOFS

NO ONE is permitted on your roof EXCEPT LW APPROVED contractors. If you hire a contractor to clean or repair your roof, and they damage your roof in any way, you are responsible for any and all repair costs.

NOTICE **UNAUTHORIZED** SIGNS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON LAUDERDALE WEST PROPERTY

SIGNS ...of any kind, are NOT permitted on Lauderdale West property. Lauderdale West property includes all areas outside your home. This includes any grassy areas, your driveway, any public area, including stop signs, trees, utility poles and even in your windows. Signs for Open Houses. Garage Sales, Parties, Political (except as specified on page 6), Greetings etc. are not allowed.

Unauthorized signs will be removed and the owner will be subject to fines.

GUTTERS All gutters are the responsibility of the owner. They must be kept clean both inside and out meaning the owner must remove, on a regular basis, all leaves and trees that may be growing out of the gutters. If the debris in the gutter causes damage to your roof or fascia board, you will be held responsible for all repair costs.

Gutters should be cleaned every other month especially if you have trees near your homes.



IRRIGATION SYSTEM INFORMATION

GARY COX IRRIGATION is doing a wonderful job keeping our grass watered. Wet checks are performed in the entire Community on a monthly basis. They check for broken pipes and sprinkler heads. Of course, if you are aware of brown spots or broken sprinkler heads that need to be repaired or replaced, please call Edna (954-473-2595) in our Maintenance Department and she will place a work order for the issue. You can even call me, Bernadette (954) 473-8219 Ext. 104, and I will place the work order with Edna.

During the rainy season, you may not notice the sprinklers working, that is because our new system has a rain gauge. If this gauge has at least 1 ½ inches of water in it, the sprinklers will not turn on. Remember too much water invites pesky bugs and weeds to our property, both of which we are trying to avoid.

REMEMBER!!! Please do not park on the grass. Cars destroy sprinkler heads and irrigation lines. If we see any cars parked that have broken any part of our system, GARY COX IRRIGATION, will repair the breakage and you will be



SERVICE AND COMPANION SUPPORT ANIMALS

Service and emotional support animals are not pets, so restrictions that apply to pets do not apply to them. Emotional support animals are companion animals that provide therapeutic benefits for people with mental disabilities or medical issues. These animals do not have to be trained, unlike service animals that are trained individually to perform specific tasks to help a person who is disabled. You must not discriminate against someone with one of these animals any more than someone with a wheelchair.

IF YOU REQUIRE THE SERVICES OF A SUPPORT OR COMFORT ANIMAL

..... in Lauderdale West, you have obligations you must abide by to be in good standing:

- A doctor's letter is required stating your need for an "emotional support dog".
- You must register your pet with the Applications and Approvals office.
- You must show a current dog license and proof that vaccinations/shots are up to date for your animal.

By following these guidelines, everyone benefits including your pet. Failure to register and meet the above requirements will result in fines. Thank you for your cooperation.

ANIMAL OWNERS Take Note!



Lauderdale West is still a NO PET Community. The Board continues to receive complaints about the increase in the number of animals on our property and residents who do not leash or clean up after their animals. Animal noise i.e. barking, crowing etc. has also become an issue.

LW has several 'park like' areas throughout the Community. These are not areas where you can let your animal off leash – for several reasons:

- 1. Residents are responsible for animals that reside in their homes.
- 2. Owners of animals must follow all City and County Ordinances.
- 3. The City of Plantation has a Leash Law all animals MUST be on a leash and personally attended when they are out of the home.
- 4. There are alligators swimming in our lakes and canals dogs are one of their favorite meals.
- 5. There are foxes, coyotes and raccoons in the area and could be a danger to your animals.
- 6. Owners must clean up after their animal in these park areas, as well as anywhere in Lauderdale West. Be advised, you must properly dispose of the bag in your trash container. Do not put it down a drainage grate or throw it in the lakes or canals. This becomes a bacterial hazard to our water system.



SINGLE FAMILY HOME NON-SCHEDULED TILE ROOF CLEANING



As the painters have completed their contract for painting and roof cleaning for 2020, tile roof cleaning is on hold until 2021. However, if you would like your tile roof cleaned in early 2021, please see the information below.

Single family homeowners who would like to have their tile roof cleaned may do so at their expense if your roof is not scheduled to be cleaned or your house painted in 2021.

The cost of roof cleaning is \$400.00 to be paid by the homeowner with check payable to "Broward Boys Painting" and delivered to painters when they arrive to clean the roof. The painters will also spray a mold retardant on the tile after the cleaning.

- · Owner must call Maintenance for Work Order Number.
- Roof can only be cleaned once a year to preserve the finish or paint.
- Edna in Maintenance will advise owner the year roof was installed and include that on the Work Order along with owner's telephone number. (Year is important because Broward Boys must know what pressure to use.)
- · Edna will email Work Order to Joanne Hill.
- Joanne will coordinate timing with Broward Boys and owner.
- Broward Boys will close the work order with Edna. She will then enter the information into the system. This completes the circle and provides the accurate information we will need for the future.

DO NOT TOUCH THE **LITTLE BLACK BOXES**



We live in a water community and wherever you have water, you are more susceptible to rats. Throughout our Community, there are rodent bait boxes set up by our pest control company to deter/kill rats/rodents. Each box is numbered and has been strategically placed on the property against the house.

- Do not move the boxes. The boxes MUST remain where they have been placed. Each box is marked on a map and must remain in that spot.
- You will be **fined** if the box on your property is not in its designated position.
- Do not TOUCH the boxes. They are filled with poison.
- · If a rodent problem occurs, call maintenance at 954-473-2595 and report it.
- Broken or missing bait box replacement cost is \$22. We will charge the resident when one is missing.

MAIN POOL RENOVATIONS

In April and May we met with the three contractors to discuss proposals to repair and renovate the pool. Your Board gained so much knowledge about pools, filters, chemicals, and the like.

The Board received three proposals for the repair and renovations to the pool at the Main Clubhouse. These repairs and renovations include re-surfacing, retiling, upgrading the lights inside the pool in order to allow longer swimming hours, changing from a chlorine-based filter system to a salt-based filter system and more. We converted the spas to the salt-based filtration system several years ago. If you haven't tried a spa to feel the difference, you should. No more fading of swimsuits or caustic chemicals drying your skin.

As you may be aware, we have had many complaints regarding unclean tiles in the pool. That is caused by individuals not showering before entering the pool to remove sunscreen from the surface of their skin. We have what's called a gravity-fed filtration system on the top of the pool. This was the norm back when the pool was installed. The system available today is suction-based and much better at removing leaves and film from the water surface. Unfortunately, we cannot convert to the suction-based system as that would require removing and replacing the entire pool. That cost would be prohibitive.

After much consideration, we chose our current pool contractor, Joe Granino of Granino's Pool and Patio Service.

We must obtain the services of an electrician, aquatic engineer to prepare drawings for all work that must be done as well as an engineer to prepare a survey of the pool and the Clubhouse in order to apply to the City of Plantation and the Broward Health Department for the proper permits.

This is a long process, especially given that the City is somewhat shorthanded due to the Covid-19 pandemic and therefore acquiring permits is taking longer than usual.

Work on the pool will begin in early November. Mr. Granino urged us to wait until after the Summer to begin as the pool will be empty and the extreme heat can cause cracking of the concrete if left with no water. We anticipate the pool to be reopened by the 2020 Holiday Season.





CITY OF PLANTATION BUILDING PERMITS

Residents who have construction/renovation/modification projects pending which require City of Plantation permits, please be patient. During this Covid-19 Pandemic, the City, as well as Lauderdale West, is short-staffed and the permitting process has been hindered because of that. We understand your frustration, i.e., your roof is not being replaced as quickly as you may like. It is out of our control. Patience is a virtue!



Here are 7 rules to live by:

1. "EMPTY AND CLEAN IF YOU WANT TO BE GREEN"

Do not contaminate other recycling materials with food particles and liquids. This can damage containers and make them unfit to be recycled.

2. "DON'T BAG RECYCLABLES"

Only put loose items into recycling. The recycling facility does not have time to untie bags, so they will be sent to the landfill.

3. "COATED PAPER CAUSES PROBLEMS"

Waxy paper cups and shiny or sparkly gift bags are examples of coated paper. If they have been treated or coated, they cannot be recycled.

4. "GREASE IS GROSS"

Oil and water don't mix; when the grease from your recyclables transfers to other paper goods, it can spoil the batch of mulch at the paper mill. Parts soiled by grease should be cut out of paper materials. Toss only clean cardboard into recycling.

5. "IF IT TANGLES, THEN IT MANGLES"

Tanglers are items that can get stuck in the equipment at a recycling facility. Don't recycle ropes, strapping, zip-ties, hoses, wires, chains, cords.

6. "DON'T BE A DANGEROUS DUMPER"

Certain items can be dangerous when mixed with recycling: batteries, light bulbs, medications and lighter fluids are examples of unsafe items.

7. "IF IN DOUBT, THROW IT OUT"

Do not add to the financial and environmental cost of trucking garbage from recycling facilities to landfills.

SOLID WASTE, RECYCLING & BULK PICKUP

When Plantation and the surrounding area is under the threat of a hurricane, there is basic information you should remember regarding your trash collection.

Solid Waste/Trash & Recycling Collection

Residential and commercial/multi-family solid waste and recycling collections will be suspended in the event a Hurricane Watch has been posted.

Once debris collection begins, debris must be placed along the curbside/right-of-way (ROW) and must be separated by debris type.

- **Vegetative Debris** includes shrubs, palm fronds, tree trimmings, grass and leaves, twigs or cut up branches
- Construction & Demolition Debris (C&D) materials relating directly to construction or demolition of buildings, such as cement, dry-wall, glass, insulation, concrete blocks, etc
- White Goods Debris appliances, including refrigerators, ranges, washing machines, clothes dryers, freezers, microwave ovens, air conditioners, etc
- **E-Goods Debris** Electronics, including TVs, computers, stereos, phones, DVD players, etc.

Bulk Pickup

Waste Management will also suspend bulk trash pickup once a Hurricane Watch has been posted.

Make sure you follow these rules to ensure your debris is collected:

- All storm related landscaping debris should be placed in a pile on your property's swale adjacent to, but not blocking, the roadway.
- Tree debris such as branches and tree trunks should be cut into sections and piled neatly together.
- Place vegetative debris away from mailboxes, water meters, street signs, light poles, and fire hydrants to allow room for heavy machinery to pick up debris.
- Do not place debris in the roadway, where it can fall into the roadway, or on top of storm drains.
- UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES should bulk pickup items be comingled with landscape/vegetation. Mixed loads WILL NOT be picked up.

NEW MAINTENANCE PROCEDURES

Due to the current COVID-19 situation, our workers are not allowed to enter your homes or plexes.

If you have a situation which requires the Maintenance Department, you MUST contact Edna in the Maintenance Office directly at 954-473-2595 or by email: maintenancedept@lauderdalewest.org. **DO NOT** address our maintenance staff concerning your issue as this will only delay your job getting done.

If the work to be done is outside your home, you do not need to be at home when the work is done.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES: Maintenance staff will no longer be available for emergency calls after business hours or on weekends. If you have a plumbing or electrical emergency after business hours or on a weekend, you must call an outside contractor at your own expense. If you have a "medical emergency", please call 911 immediately.

EXCESSIVE CALLS: We have discovered that our maintenance staff often make repeated calls to a residence for the same problem. During their first visit the resident is instructed as to what is needed to correct the problem. If repeated calls are necessary for the same situation, it is apparent that the resident is not complying with those instructions.

Therefore, we charge residents who do not comply and fix the problem. After the second visit for the same problem, the resident will receive a letter stating the problem and the need to fix it. If there is a third call, the resident will then be charged \$50 for non-compliance as well as the cost of the maintenance call for the problem

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digital Defense at HOME AND ON THE ROAD

You wouldn't leave your house unlocked when you go on vacation, but are you protecting your online identity when you travel? Here are some tips from AAA Chief Information Security Officer, Gopal Padinjaruveetil.

AAA May/June 2020

- **Use advanced protection:** Enable multifactor authentication such as a one-time logic code sent to your smartphone for accounts like Facebook, Google and Drop Box.
- Turn off Bluetooth when not in use: Bluetooth-enabled accessories such as earpieces and external keyboards are convenient, but cybercriminals can pair with your phone's open Bluetooth connection and use it to steal personal information.
- **Don't fall for phishing scams:** Phishing scams use attractive offers to entice shoppers to click on links within emails. If you receive an email with a deal that looks too good to be true, or if it has a link or attachment that seems suspicious, don't click on it.
- Avoid public Wi-Fi networks: Conducting personal business, like online banking or shopping on public networks, can allow attackers to intercept your information. To check your credit card statement or shop online while traveling, switch to your mobile device's data internet connection.
- **Keep your device software updated:** And while you're at it, make sure you have good anti-virus and anti-malware software on your devices.
- **Don't connect your mobile device:** Connecting to any computer or charging station that you do not control, such as a charging station at an airport terminal or a shared computer in a library, with a USB cable can allow software running on that computer to access your sensitive data or install new software on your device.

Take precautions to make sure you always keep your online identity safe.



- **Be Prepared**Start running your ice makers now and bagging the ice in freezer bags. Fill as much space
- 1. Start running your ice makers now and bagging the ice in freezer bags. Fill as much space in between your freezer items as you can.
- 2. Freeze regular tap water for pets, cleaning or drinking in Tupperware-type containers or empty plastic bottles. REMEMBER: leave a small bit of space between the top of the water and lids so as the ice expands it won't crack the container.
- 3. Start using up perishables to make more room for ice in the freezer.
- 4. Fill up all vehicles with gas and check tires and oil.
- 5. Get cash from ATM or bank (ATMs may not work after a storm); at least enough money to get you through tolls and gas to get out of town, should there be an evacuation. Call your bank if you plan on leaving the area so they don't freeze your card for out-of-area "suspicious" transactions.
- 6. Take a screenshot of all your important documents and send to your email. Take originals in sealed bags or plastic, waterproof bins.
- 7. Have sufficient pet food and supplies. Vet records are required in case you need to shelter your pet at a storm-safe facility.
- 8. Make an evacuation plan and share with family members so they know where you are headed.
- 9. Consider putting heirlooms and photos in plastic, waterproof bins in a high place (high shelf or safe room), if you don't plan to take them with you.
- 10. SECURE ALL FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION PROPERLY.
- 11. Place old rags and beach towels on your windowsills. Even with the best windows and shutters, water seepage from wind pressure happens. A few damp towels are better than soaked drywall or floors.
- 12. Shutter windows and doors and bring everything outside into your garage or house NOW. Do not wait until the day before. Better to get it done early and relax than wait until it is too late.
- 13. If you don't already have your hurricane supplies, get them now. Shelves may already be empty in many places.

- Incontinent or non-trained individuals must wear swim diapers
- · No smoking or vaping is allowed in the pool area

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Fraud Prevention Checklist

Keep your account(s) secure: What you can do now to help fight fraud.

1. Use your bank's mobile app

• The mobile app is the best way for you to stay on top of any suspicious account activity. You should be able to set up alerts, lock or unlock your card, dispute a transaction and more through their mobile application.

2. Check your contact information

- You're not the only one protecting your account. Your bank and credit card company are working to protect you. If they spot an issue, they want to get in touch with you the quickest way possible.
- Provide your mobile number so they can alert you to potential fraud.

3. Create a strong unique password

- Strong passwords are 8 or more characters long and include a combination of numbers, symbols and upper- and lowercase letters.
- Use multifactor authentication when possible.

4. Protect your devices

• Keep your phone, tablet and computer up to date with the latest browser, operating system and antivirus software.

5. Keep your account information secure


- · Go paperless.
- · Never write your PIN on the back of your card.
- Use trusted online payment methods, such as Bill Pay or Zelle ® instead of writing checks.

6. Know the red flags that signal a scam

- Scammers pressure people to send money, threaten law enforcement action or demand gift cards as a form of payment.
- Remember, if you provide your information or send money to a scammer, there is often little your financial institution can do to help get your money back.

7. Fight fraud with these quick tips

- **Do not share your information.** Your financial institution will never ask you to give personal information in an email, text, or non-secure website.
- **Do not click on suspicious links.** Be wary of unsolicited links from unknown sources.
- **Do not be intimidated.** Scams often try to create urgency or alarm by threatening to close or suspend your account if you don't take immediate action.
- **Do not be fooled.** Never transfer money to someone's account claiming that they need the money for urgent help or protection.
- Do not share security codes. If your financial institution sends you a security code by text or email to confirm your identity, never share it with anyone else.
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A Thanksgiving meal of choice for Americans consists of turkey, pumpkin and cranberries. Historically these items were available and

thought to have been eaten by the Colonists and Native Americans in the fall of 1621, in what has become known as the first Thanksgiving. Can you imagine this being possible? The first Thanksgiving feast was eaten with spoons and knives as the Pilgrims didn't know what forks were at the time.

President Jefferson called a federal Thanksgiving proclamation "the most ridiculous idea ever conceived". President Lincoln declared the last Thursday in November as a national holiday in 1863. Then in 1941 Congress established the fourth Thursday in November as the national holiday.

Since the depression of the 1930s, the Friday after Thanksgiving has been called 'Black Friday' because stores hope this busy shopping day will take them out of the red and into positive profits. Black Friday still draws the biggest crowd of the entire holiday weekend, with 115 million people. A total of 69% of Americans chase those deals like a retail-driven Olympic sport. That may explain why we can't find a mall parking spot.

In 1953, a Swanson employee accidentally ordered a co-

lossal shipment of Thanksgiving turkeys (260 tons, to be exact). To deal with the excess, Swanson took inspiration from the prepared foods served on airplanes and came up with the idea of filling 5,000 aluminum trays with the turkey – along with cornbread dressing, gravy, peas, and sweet potatoes to complete the offering. The 98-cents meals, now known as a TV dinners were a hit.

Thanks to all that food we gobble up on Thanksgiving and houseguests stressing out the plumbing system, Roto-Rooter reports that kitchen drains, garbage disposals, and yes, toilets, require more attention the day after Thanksgiving than any other day.

The winning combo of football and Thanksgiving kicked off way before there was anything called the NFL. The first Thanksgiving football game was a college match between Yale and Princeton in 1876, only 13 years after Lincoln made Thanksgiving a national holiday. Soon after, Thanksgiving was picked for the date of the college football championships. By the 1890s, thousands of college and high school football rivalries were played every Thanksgiving.

In 1926, President Calvin Coolidge received a somewhat odd Thanksgiving gift in the form of a live raccoon. Meant to be eaten (the Mississippi man who sent it called raccoon meat "toothsome"), the Coolidge family adopted the pet and named it Rebecca.

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
